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It all got started when the Wright brothers were given a flying toy with a rubber band by their father when they were children. *Interesting side note, Frank Lloyd Wright's father (a different Wright) invented Lincoln Logs. We need play to work well.*

Orville Wright (no relation to the brilliant popcornist Orville Redenbacher pictured here) was daring and Wilbur Wright was visionary—but they both had intellectual depth, mechanical skills, and a disciplined work ethic. The brothers were of the same blood, but different personalities. They loved their work so much, they weren't dependent upon accolades or attention to keep going.



The brothers began their collaboration as "The Wright Brothers" when Wilbur was twenty-two and Orville was eighteen. They first began making printing machines,

then they switched to a bike repair shop, and then things took off when they decided, "hey, let's try making flying machines!" Their first flying machine was simple—a kite!

Their flying machines really began to take flight when they read about a failure—a German glider pilot's flight that took a literal nose-dive. Wilbur also studied birds and asked for some help on aeronautics from the Smithsonian Institute. To get it right the Wright brothers needed to stay focused on their goal and mission. They both wore suits to work (they were from NC not AZ), never swore, and honored the Sabbath. Wilbur described their collaboration: "My brother Orville and I lived together, worked together, and in fact thought together." They had to stay encouraged and persistent through failure after failure.

They needed to keep their minds fresh and open to think outside the box. They invented backwards. Instead of creating everything first, they just tried to get airborne. Once they were airborne they observed in the air what they needed to invent to stay airborne even longer!

They were realists and so they never flew together at the same time. There was freedom to disagree—they were great at

arguing, but they didn't fight (there's a difference). The famous siblings could think freely, ask questions, give feedback and even pushback, without it becoming personal. As their fame grew, whenever flying achievements were referred to, each never spoke in the first person, "I did this," rather they always said, "We did this..."

The Wright brothers can teach us a thing or two about not only flying, but faithing together in community. We're brothers and sisters in Christ, but we're not the same. Our differences can strengthen us, rather than divide us. Our mission unites us. We can disagree and remain connected. We're in God's forever family together. Playing together is not only fun, it teaches us about good works and working together "good." We serve Christ because we want to, we have an inner calling that inspires and fuels us to grow in faith, serve others, and make a difference. The Spirit of God infuses us with creativity and openness. We're free to receive feedback, without being offended. We're in a relationship of give and take, mutuality, and collaboration—we turn our "me" upside down and remember the "we" too. The needs and interests of others are considered in addition to our own. We persevere in the midst of failures and setbacks. We learn from failure, rather than fear it. We don't have to be perfect—we can try new things on the fly and see if they fly or not. If they don't—we take notes for next time and celebrate a new lesson learned and try something different next time. The Apostle Paul huddles us together for a good forever family talk:



A Lending Hand



Mission co-worker César Carhuachín, as reported by Presbyterian World Mission, lives in Barranquilla, Colombia, more than 100 miles from the Venezuelan border, but the chaos and desperation that pervade this country confront him every day. In Colombia, just beyond the Reformed University campus where Cesar teaches ministerial students, he sees Venezuelans trying to survive by peddling candy and bottle water on the street.

More than three million Venezuelans have left their country, where political repression has thrust tremendous economic hardship and pervasive

shortages of food and medicine on the people. Their plight tugs at César's heart and engages his life as a Christian disciple, a mission co-worker, a minister and a professor. Our gifts to Presbyterian World Mission enable us to send people like César to places where they work with global partners to transform lives for the sake of the gospel. César has invested his life in crossing boundaries to share the good news of God's love in Jesus Christ.

César says he has been inspired by Mark 10:45: *The Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.* "Jesus tells us in this passage that he was and he is in the world to serve people and to give his life in sacrificial service," César says. For César, that Scripture is a call to "give my time, gifts, creativity, and whatever I can to enrich, to affirm, and to empower the life and ministry of others."

CASA MARIA MINISTRY

Immanuel is one of many organizations in Tucson who regularly help to feed the hungry through donations of sack lunches to the Casa Maria Free Kitchen. Located in the Santa Rita neighborhood of South Tucson, **Casa Maria feeds nearly 1,000 people every day**—local residents and homeless alike. Immanuel's commitment is for 500 lunches every 4 weeks. Immanuel members prepare 350 lunches at home, and our Deacons prepare 150 at church.



Want to help make sandwiches? Each lunch should contain two meat and cheese sandwiches (please use only butter/margarine—no mayo, mustard, lettuce or tomato), a piece of fruit (such as a banana, peach, pear, or orange), and a dessert (2 cookies, 1 brownie, etc.). Please bring your sack lunches to the church between 8:00am and 9:00am. The Casa Maria team leaves promptly at 9:00am.





Bottle Cap Ministry

Collecting bottle caps has been a long tradition here at Immanuel. Our amazing Lucy Greenleaf has dedicated an incredible amount of her time and energy leading this ministry. Thank you Lucy!



The money received from recycling bottle caps goes to the State Oncology Center in Hermisillo to benefit children undergoing

medical treatments and their families. These families cannot afford the cost of medical care. The support covers hospital fees, food, medicines for cancer, lab tests, and other items required during treatment.

Several times each month Lucy sorts and organizes the donated bottle caps. She drives the collection down to Dr. Pazos at the office of Compañeros en Misión in Nogales. Dr. Pazos then takes the collection to Hermisillo for recycling. The money is then given to the State Oncology Center.

Here are some guidelines for collecting caps that makes it easier for us to prepare the collection to be delivered to Compañeros en Misión:

- \Rightarrow All prescription/pill bottle caps are accepted as well as water and soda bottle caps.
- \Rightarrow No metal of any kind.
- \Rightarrow For larger caps/lids, please check to make sure it has the triangle recycling symbol \langle
- \Rightarrow Lids must be clean and free of any food residue.
- \Rightarrow No pumps or plungers (i.e. hand pump soap bottles).
- \Rightarrow No food containers or large plastic tubs.
- \Rightarrow Please bag in strong trash bags with no tears or holes.
- ⇒ If in doubt, please do not donate. If a bag shows up with a piece of metal or other non-recyclable item—they will discard the entire bag at the recycling center.

World Food Week of Action — October 13-20 *An Invitation*

Famine and extreme hunger are a reality today for many of our brothers and sisters. In Matthew 25, Jesus challenges us to respond as if he himself were hungry. The Presbyterian Hunger Program has partners working in places where people are suffering, and the need is urgent. We want to do more, and we are asking for your help.


There is enough food in the world for everyone. But because of poor access and distribution, extreme weather, and political instability, many

don't have enough to survive. Extreme famine has been declared in Yemen, Nigeria, South Sudan, and Somalia. An official declaration of famine means that at least 20% of households face an extreme lack of food—that's one person in five. Every day, 16,000 children die from hunger-related causes and preventable disease (statistics from FoodAid International, <u>https://food-aid.org/</u> and the Presbyterian Hunger Program).

Right here in Tucson, children go to bed hungry at night. Generally speaking, poverty is the culprit in our community. Although many schools provide free breakfasts and lunches, children still don't have enough food over the weekend. This is why we at Immanuel support Haven Totes—to provide weekend food totes for kids and a food bank for their families to get the foods they so desperately need. This is why we collect food for the Eastside Food Bank. And this is why we invite you to participate October 13-20 in the revival of the Cents-Ability Offering.



On Sunday, October 13, we invite each family to take home a Cents-Ability Can and place it on your dining room or kitchen table. Each time you eat a meal (or have a snack, or go out for ice cream, or stop at Starbucks...), you are asked to make a contribution toward alleviating hunger—maybe just a few cents, perhaps a nickel or dime a meal, maybe a quarter. If you eat at a restaurant, consider "tithing" that meal when you get home (that is, make a 10% contribution to Cents-Ability). Set your own goals. We invite you to do whatever you can to help put food on someone else's table by putting a few cents in the can at every meal.

Then bring the can to worship on Sunday, October 20. We will have a special worship service that will focus on poverty, hunger, and World Food Week. The Sanctuary Choir is preparing four special musical selections and Holly Schurr will be there to play violin and timpani. Pastor John's third sermon on the Lord's Prayer ("Thy kingdom come") will add to our understanding of what we can be doing to bring about God's kingdom on earth. 50% of our Cents-Ability collection will be sent to the Presbyterian Hunger Program to help alleviate famine worldwide. The other 50% will be used locally—our Missions Team will decide where it best can be applied.

Cents-Ability originated in 1976 as "Two-Cents-A-Meal," a project begun by Presbyterian Women to involve individuals and families in a corporate response to world hunger. Cents-Ability is a small first step in the battle against hunger and poverty. This simple act is an expression of thanks for what we have received. It is also a commitment to share with others in response to Jesus' command to give them something to eat. It may not seem like much, but small acts of faithfulness can add up: One hundred persons in a congregation might collect \$105 in a week at five cents a meal. At 25 cents a meal, \$525 could be collected.



We've said it many times: Individually we can do a lot. Together we can do more. Thank you, Immanuel, for always choosing to do more.

Immanuel Receives Special Recognition

Congratulations, Immanuel! At the quarterly Presbytery meeting in August, recognition was given to churches that had participated in all four churchwide special offerings in the past year—One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost, Peace and Global Witness, and Christmas Joy. Each church received a certificate of recognition for being a "Four for Four" church. Of the 28 churches in Presbytery de Cristo, six received this recognition: Covenant (Bisbee), Immanuel, Mountain Shadows, St. John on the Desert, St. Marks, and Trinity.



But wait—there's more. When we saw the certificate, we were amazed to learn that Immanuel has been a "Four for Four" Congregation for 22 years! We have always said that this is a very caring, hospitable, committed, and dedicated congregation, and your recent actions and offerings have confirmed it. Twenty-two years is a long time to maintain a congregational commitment to helping others—but isn't that what being a church is about?

The Presbyterian Church (USA) says "Giving is a response to God's call and is a response that the Spirit has manifested in

believers since the Acts church of early Christianity. Giving for the sake of those in need is an essential component of congregational vitality and Christian identity."

The four special offerings really *are* special. They reach people whom we ordinarily cannot reach. We will always respond to the immediate needs of our community—as we have through Haven Totes as well as the ministries for migrants waiting at the border—but the quarterly special offerings give us a way to make a difference locally, nationally, and globally that we might not be able to make if we didn't have the connection to the Presbyterian Church (USA).

The next Special Offering in the rotation is Peace and Global Witness, which will be collected on October 6, World Communion Sunday. This offering is applied to peacemaking efforts and to address systems of injustice around the world. Fifty percent is used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, *including our own culture*. Twenty-five percent is used by mid councils (presbyteries) for ministries of peace and reconciliation. And twenty-five percent may be used by congregations for local efforts in witness and peacemaking. Last October, Immanuel donated its portion (\$775) to Frontera de Cristo to expand their ministries on the streets of Agua Prieta. This year, our Missions Team has elected to support The Middle Eastern Presbyterian Fellowship with our 25% portion.

Through our special offerings, we empower people around the globe to live happier, healthier, safer, and more rewarding lives because we share the good news of the Gospel of Jesus Christ who said, "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly" (John 10:10). Individually we can do a lot. Together we can do more. Congratulations, people of Immanuel—you have consistently done more.


