## Thanksgathering

Why do we gather? We gather to celebrate, to mark milestones, to solve problems, to make decisions, to watch a game, to worship, to grieve, to learn, to eat, to commemorate, to honor, to protest, to pray, to say hello and to say goodbye. We gather to support a loved one in a time of need. We gather to find strength and courage. We gather to concoct ideas and enact plans.

On the fourth Thursday of this month we will gather to give thanks—Thanksgathering. Thanksgathering is a time to show gratitude and awareness with others for the blessedness of our lives. To treasure those around us and to remember how unique this moment is—savoring and drinking deeply of the cup of gratitude. In the book *The Art of Gathering* Priya Parker talks about a phrase used in a 16<sup>th</sup> century Japanese tea ceremony: *ichi-go ichi-e*, which essentially means "one meeting, one moment in your life that will never happen again." We may meet again, but fully take in this moment, because in a year's time at the next gathering we'll have a new and different experience because we will be different people bringing new experiences with us, because we are changing and have changed. Approach each gathering as a *holy ichi-go ichi-e* because life is fragile and so very special. This thanksgathering you may have countless blessings to recount or you may have to do a lot of soul-searching to come up with just a few—either way count your blessings. Thanks turns November into Yesvember.

We can also learn from the Jewish Passover during Thanksgathering by asking ourselves: Why is this night different from all other nights? Why is this gathering different than all other gatherings? Paying attention, looking back, saying thanks to friends and loved ones, and giving thanks to God is the key to a well-lived life. And God's Word encourages us to live this way perpetually, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. (1 Thess. 5:16-18). My prayer for you, for our church, for our country, and our world is that they will know us by not only our love, but by our thanks. "Yes! They will know we are Christians by our thanks, by our thanks!" Happy Thanksgathering Immanuel!

## **Faithful Servant**

In a recent report, Leslie Vogel, who is a member of Grand Canyon Presbytery, reported on the interactions she had with Lois Kroeler, a missionary in Cuba. Leslie is also the regional liaison of the Presbyterian Church for Guatemala and Mexico.

She says, "when I was 23 years old, I met Lois, a Presbyterian woman who as a young mission volunteer had followed her heart and faith and had stayed in Cuba when virtually all other mission workers had left at the beginning of the



Cuban revolution in 1959. Lois chose not only to stay in Cuba, but she became a commissioned church worker, focusing on Christian education, organizing national retreats and events for children and youth and continuing the growth and development of Christian music produced with a uniquely Cuban flavor. When I saw her again two years ago in Washington state, Lois was busy writing music to be used in liturgical settings. Once more I was moved and inspired by her musical gifts and indomitable spirit, just as I had been in 1981."

## **Casa Maria Ministry**

Immanuel is one of many organizations in Tucson who regularly help to feed the hungry through donations of sack lunches to the Casa Maria Free Kitchen. Located in the Santa Rita neighborhood of South Tucson, **Casa Maria feeds nearly 1,000 people every day**—local residents and homeless alike. Immanuel's commitment is for 500 lunches every 4 weeks. Immanuel members prepare 350 lunches at home, and our Deacons prepare 150 at church.



Want to help make sandwiches? Each lunch should contain two meat and cheese sandwiches (please use only butter/margarine—no mayo, mustard, lettuce or tomato), a piece of fruit (such as a banana, peach, pear, or orange), and a dessert (2 cookies, 1 brownie, etc.). Please bring your sack lunches to the church between 8:00am and 9:00am. The Casa Maria team leaves promptly at 9:00am.



Each Christmas, YOTO holds a student holiday party for the students. They look forward to the party with the staff and volunteers who have become their family. It is only with your support that this Christmas party can happen. #### The Late 80s at Immanuel: Do You Remember?

While we were writing the articles about the choir over the past couple of months, we had the opportunity to look through Dove newsletters from 1985-1989. We learned some surprising things and we thought you might enjoy these tidbits of our history. How much of this did you know? Or how much do you remember?

The 80s were an amazing time at Immanuel! Did you know that since the mid-1980s—for more than 30 years—we've been holding our Maundy Thursday communion service around tables; wearing red on Pentecost; hosting a family Advent festival on the first Sunday in Advent; going Christmas Caroling together; and making 450+ sack lunches for the homeless at Casa Maria? And back then, when we took the lunches to Casa Maria, we stayed to make lemonade and help serve the guests. But wait—there's more!

#### From 1984-1985:

- During the winter of 1984-85, a fellowship group was begun for those in between the teenage years and the senior years—it was called Betweeners. They met monthly to enjoy activities such as bowling, progressive dinners, movie discussions, potlucks, charades, Trivial Pursuit, and even conversation with friends from Central America.
- For a few years beginning in 1985, we held "Lenten Home Communions" and "Advent Home Communions." Each week, one Immanuel family opened their home to anyone who wanted to come for worship, fellowship, and Holy Communion.

#### From 1986-1987:

- The wrought iron art work on the west side of the administration building, "Jesus, the Good Shepherd," was designed by artist Ken Lynch and artisan John Reinhard. The Reinhards were members of Immanuel in the 1980s, and John had also made a similar piece for a church in Iowa. This beautiful work of art was dedicated on February 16, 1986, following worship.
- The One Great Hour of Sharing offering at Easter in 1986 was \$2,546!
- The first Immanuel mission delegation to visit Frontera de Cristo was on May 10, 1986.
- Deacon Dan's Cupboard was started by the Immanuel Deacons in the fall of 1986. It held a stock of nonperishable foods for families in need. The first Sunday of each month was a regular food donation day, but
  congregation members frequently brought contributions for the food cupboard every week. And Chuck
  Wook championed all our food collections.
- Immanuel Presbyterian, New Spirit Lutheran (then Spanish Trail Lutheran), St. Matthew's Episcopal, and Sahuaro Christian churches formed an eastside consortium of churches to do things together in the community. The churches alternated years for hosting a community Thanksgiving worship service on the night before Thanksgiving. And in August 1987, those same four churches founded the Eastside Advocates for Resettlement (EAR) to temporarily assist people in serious need of food, housing, and other basic necessities until they could become self-sufficient. Rich Nelson was Immanuel's representative, and Rich and Jean along with Lee Boteler shepherded this ministry.
- During the spring, summer, and fall of 1987, Immanuel sent a
  work group every month to help Frontera de Cristo build the first
  Presbyterian church in Sonora—the church we now know as Lirio
  de los Valles (Lily of the Valley) Presbyterian Church. The building
  was dedicated on World Communion Sunday that year.

In April 1987, a work group from Immanuel hauled 23 tons of dirt to level the ground in preparation for pouring a concrete floor for Lirio de Los Valles church.



- For several years in the late 80s, Immanuel members collected toys at Christmas for 50 children at the church in Agua Prieta.
- In February 1987, a second telephone line and a phone with a "hold" button were added to the church office to help handle all the telephone traffic. And speaking of phones, in 1987, the Deacons purchased a "portable telephone" (not sure exactly what that may have looked like) for a church member who was convalescing at home.
- The first handbell choir was formed in November 1987.
- In the winter of 1987, the youth group ski trip to Pinetop Presbyterian Church got snowed in, and the kids were forced to return late to Tucson and miss a day of school!

#### From 1988-1989:

- In January 1988, retired PCUSA minister Rev. Erwin Ruklic led a 5-week adult Sunday school class called "Celebrating 1,000 Years of Christianity in Russia." During the 1970s, Rev. Ruklic had served English-speaking congregations in Bogota, Tokyo, and Bangkok.
- We began sending teens to Youth Triennium in 1988.
- In April 1988, Dr. Bill Marshall organized a tutoring project to help students improve academically.
- In May 1988, a Pentecost offering was taken to support four struggling churches: Tortolita, St. John on the Desert, and The Holy Way in Tucson, and Faith Presbyterian in Sierra Vista. All are now vital, growing churches in Presbytery de Cristo.
- In September 1988, Immanuel sent a 29-person work team to Agua Prieta to put ceilings, insulation, doors, and door hardware on 3 new homes that had been built by Presbyterians from all over the United States. The homes had electricity, but no indoor plumbing (at least not bathrooms). In later months, we built outhouses for the homes.
- Rev. Angel de Rosas, an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ, was hired as a seminary intern in September of 1988, to serve for a year as our associate pastor. Pastor Angel held a Bachelor of Arts degree from Philippine Christian University, a Bachelor of Divinity from Union Theological Seminary in Manila, and a Master of Theology from Princeton Seminary. When he left Immanuel, he began his PhD studies at Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, California. He now lives in Baldwin Park, CA.



- In October 1988, the first Fall picnic was held at Lakeside Park (because the Spring picnic was so popular!).
- The first year we participated in Operation Deep Freeze was December 1988, in cooperation with the Salvation Army, Travelers Aid Society, Primavera Foundation, and the Tucson Police Department. We hosted the homeless on very cold nights and made them breakfast the next morning. Transportation was provided by Travelers Aid.
- A ministry to older adults started in February 1989, and by April, it was known as Desert Sages. Let's hear it for 30 years of Sages!
- Sunday, March 5, 1989, was the first Sunday we moved into the new education building (now Towner Hall). The youth served the congregation a salad luncheon. The dedication service for the new building was held during worship on May 21<sup>st</sup>.

It's an impressive history, and so many of these ministries continue today. But we know it's not just about us. It's about what happens with God. In his book *The Greatest Prayer*, John Dominic Crossan observes "God's kingdom did not, could not, and will not begin, continue, or conclude without human collaboration." It's divine intervention and human collaboration together. Our name was chosen well—Immanuel: God with us.


## **November Happenings**
