"The Skeleton – Prophesy to the Bones" by Rev. John C. Tittle

Scripture Reading: Ezekiel 37:1-14 NRSV

The hand of the Lord came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the Lord and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. ²He led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. ³ He said to me, "Mortal, can these bones live?" I answered, "O Lord God, you know." ⁴ Then he said to me, "Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the Lord. ⁵Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. ⁶ I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the Lord." ⁷ So I prophesied as I had been commanded; and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. 8 I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them; but there was no breath in them. ⁹ Then he said to me, "Prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord God: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live." 10 I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude. ¹¹ Then he said to me, "Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely.' 12 Therefore prophesy, and say to them, Thus says the Lord God: I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people; and I will bring you back to the land of Israel. 13 And you shall know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people. 14 I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live, and I will place you on your own soil; then you shall know that I, the Lord, have spoken and will act, says the Lord.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. What jumped out at you about this passage? What feelings do you get reading it?
- 2. What was a hopeless situation you got through in your life? How did you get out?
- 3. The dry bones represented Israel in exile--ten years they had been away from their homeland. What are some other "dry bone" experiences us mortals go through?
- 4. Ezekiel mentioned the hand of the Lord came upon him. Have you ever been grabbed hold of by God and shown something?
- 5. Trust in God first takes honesty (seeing the dry bones). Why is it so important to be realistic about our situation?
- 6. The miracle of the dry bones was done by God, yet the prophet was commanded to participate. Why does God want our participation?
- 7. The miracle happened in two phases. What three things was Ezekiel commanded to prophesy to?
- 8. Why is the Holy Spirit so absolutely vital? What does the Spirit do?
- 9. God intervenes, speaks, acts, and invites our participation. Verses twelve and following says what God will do. How might these words give us encouragement today?
