"Questioning Psalms" by Rev. John C. Tittle

Scripture Reading: Psalm 77 NRSV

1 I cry aloud to God, aloud to God, that he may hear me. 2 In the day of my trouble I seek the Lord; in the night my hand is stretched out without wearying; my soul refuses to be comforted. 3 I think of God, and I moan; I meditate, and my spirit faints. 4 You keep my eyelids from closing; I am so troubled that I cannot speak. 5 I consider the days of old, and remember the years of long ago. 6 I commune with my heart in the night; I meditate and search my spirit: 7 "Will the Lord spurn forever, and never again be favorable? 8 Has his steadfast love ceased forever? Are his promises at an end for all time? 9 Has God forgotten to be gracious? Has he in anger shut up his compassion?" 10 And I say, "It is my grief that the right hand of the Most High has changed." 11 I will call to mind the deeds of the Lord; I will remember your wonders of old. 12 I will meditate on all your work, and muse on your mighty deeds. 13 Your way, O God, is holy. What god is so great as our God? 14 You are the God who works wonders; you have displayed your might among the peoples. 15 With your strong arm you redeemed your people, the descendants of Jacob and Joseph. 16 When the waters saw you, O God, when the waters saw you, they were afraid; the very deep trembled. 17 The clouds poured out water; the skies thundered; your arrows flashed on every side. 18 The crash of your thunder was in the whirlwind; your lightnings lit up the world; the earth trembled and shook. 19 Your way was through the sea, your path, through the mighty waters; yet your footprints were unseen. 20 You led your people like a flock by the hand of Moses and Aaron.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. Have you ever really been mad at God? How did you express it?
- 2. What words or phrases jump out at you about this psalm?
- 3. The psalmist is grilling God, basically putting him on the witness stand. What emotions do you experience reading the psalmists questions of God?
- 4. Therapist and Auschwitz survivor Edith Eger says that *the opposite of depression is expression*. How might that apply to this psalm? How can venting to God help us to move forward in faith and life?
- 5. What do you think of this paradoxical statement in light of this passage: *We need to first conquer, to be able to yield ourselves. We have to first triumph, in order to surrender. Acquire, before we lose it all.*
- 6. What do you think of this statement by Rabbi Abraham Heschl: *the greatness of a person is measured by how many deep problems that person is concerned with--in the world and in themselves. He then goes on to say that even God has problems--just look at the Bible. God is always wrestling with the problem of human beings. God understands our problems, because he has them too!*
- 7. How might remembering and reliving God's acts in the past (the Exodus, Jesus' miracles, the crucifixion and resurrection) help us in the present?
