"Shimmying Up the Sycamore" by Rev. John C. Tittle

Scripture Reading: Luke 19: 1 - 10 NRSVue

He entered Jericho and was passing through it. ² A man was there named Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector and was rich. ³ He was trying to see who Jesus was, but on account of the crowd he could not, because he was short in stature. ⁴ So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree to see him, because he was going to pass that way. ⁵ When Jesus came to the place, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, hurry and come down, for I must stay at your house today." ⁶ So he hurried down and was happy to welcome him. ⁷ All who saw it began to grumble and said, "He has gone to be the guest of one who is a sinner." ⁸ Zacchaeus stood there and said to the Lord, "Look, half of my possessions, Lord, I will give to the poor, and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will pay back four times as much." ⁹ Then Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because he, too, is a son of Abraham. ¹⁰ For the Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost."

- 2. What is the significance of the meaning of Zacchaeus' name in this story (Innocent, Clean or Righteous)?
- 3. Who are our chief tax collectors today? How do we look down on them and crowd them out today? How can we look up to them? Eat with them?
- 4. There are themes of looking and seeking in this passage. Where do you see them?
- 5. Why did Jesus' words, "I must eat with you at your home Zacchaeus," have such an impact upon him?
- 6. How do you compare the reaction of Zacchaeus to the crowd's reaction in light of Jesus' offer of a dinner meal?
- 7. What do you think of this phrase: Gratitude and generosity are signs that our lives have been touched by Jesus Christ.
- 8. What happens to us when we forget God's goodness in our lives?
- 9. Why does Jesus share his mission statement at the end of the story?
